

Why is Youth Protection Important to Rotary?

- SAFETY Rotary is committed to ensuring safe and positive events to young and vulnerable people.
- REPUTATION Rotary wants to protect itself from the reputational damage that can occur when a member's harmful behaviour becomes publicly known.
- RISK MANAGEMENT In order to prevent harmful incidents from occurring policies and procedures like the Youth Protection Policy are key.



How do we Protect Youth?

Be familiar with the basics of the Youth Protection Policy

- ❑ Plan ahead for youth related events and know the different event risk levels:
 - LEVEL 1: Rotary is not the primary organiser
 - Know the organiser's policies and procedures
 - LEVEL 2: Rotary is the primary organiser & it's a non-overnight event
 - Have every volunteer complete the **RI Learning Centre Training Module**

"Protecting Youth Program Participants"

- Have every volunteer complete Rotary Volunteer Forms
- LEVEL 3: Rotary is the primary organiser & it's a overnight event
 - Complete all actions at Level 2 Plus
 - Complete Police Checks on every volunteer
- Email training module certificates and police check information to the Youth Protection Officer (YPO) at youthprotect@rotarydistrict9920.org



Youth Protection at Events

❑When Youth Protection applies – must have short pre-event briefing for all volunteers

Avoid 1 on 1 contact wherever practicable – rule of three

□ If incident occurs respond appropriately –

- □ take it seriously, inform event organiser, DG & YPO
- □ If in any doubt, contact one of the YPO's for assistance and
 - advice on process
- □ On advice of the YPO contact the Police
- □ Treat complainant/victim sensitively.
- □ If major disclosure made, do NOT continue with interview leave
 - this to police or other experts



- Nominate a club champion for RYPEN by end of July in the preceding year
- Commit to communicating with

- Completion of the RI Learning Centre training module and Compliance with the Youth Protection Policy



- Liaise with the District coordinator to ensure entries are received as ranked by the interview team





Challenge Camp





Young People who share physical and intellectually challenging supported by able bodied mentors resourced from the International Youth Exchange program.

Participants may have mild to moderate physical impairments, or mild intellectual impairments.

Age limits are 16 and 20 years. **International Youth Exchange Students** are also obliged to participate as mentors.

Skills Gained by RYE students

Empathy, and confidence gained from opportunities to interact between young people with disabilities and overseas students.



Rotary New Zealand - Young Totara Award

This award was presented for the first time in district 9920 in 2020. The awardee was a young Lady from Baradene College in recognition of her contribution to her community.

What you as Rotary Clubs and Rotarians need to do

- Identify young adults (under the age of 21) who have contributed to the community
- Budget for \$60 per award
- Another tool to assist with club engagement with local schools and community
- Nominate a club champion for the YTA
- YTA is in District 9970 and District 9920


Goals:

Rotary Youth Leadership Award



What you as Rotary Clubs and Rotarians need to do

- Appoint a team to manage the interviews and the interface with the RYLA operations team
- Identify suitable candidates for the event
- Identify companies that may be prepared to sponsor their employees on the course
- Manage the relationships with companies already involved
- Budget for \$975 plus GST per participant
- All participants regardless of the funder to be interviewed and approved by the Rotary Club
- Deliver participants to and collect them from RYLA
- Have club representatives at the graduation dinner
- Organise your clubs participants to attend a Rotary meeting after the event to present to the club on their experience
- Follow up with participants and keep them engaged with club activities for as long as possible.

A Rotary District 9920 Vocational and Leadership program for our Pacific Island Clubs

Two weeks in New Zealand for **six candidates**, including **one week on RYLA** Participants come from Clubs in

- Fiji
- Raratonga
- Tahiti
- Samoa
- Kiribati



Auckland based Rotary Clubs agree

• to meet the additional costs of the first week including billeting with Rotarians

Sponsoring Island Clubs pay all travel and visa costs

- Plus the cost of attendance at RYLA
- (approx. \$1500 per person for the Auckland based costs, not including travel costs)






What you as Rotary Clubs and Rotarians need to do

- Appoint a person or team to manage the interviews and the interface with the Rota Pacific team in NZ
- Identify suitable candidates for the two week event
- Budget for the return airfare to New Zealand plus passport and visa costs
- Ensure applicants have completed the online RYLA application form
- Submit the application forms to the ROTA Pacific coordinator and rank the applicants
 - The Rota Pacific co-Ordinator will respond with queries and confirmation of acceptance
- Organise your clubs participants to attend a Rotary meeting after the event to present to the club on their experience
- Follow up with participants and keep them engaged with club activities for as long as possible.
